


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From the President's Desk

Delegates to the OSFGC Convention

As per the OSFGC Bylaws, Article X Section 2:

- **(a)** Member clubs shall be eligible for representation by two delegates, one of whom shall be the club president or the elected alternate. The club president is responsible for sending the names of elected delegates and alternates to the Credentials Committee as stipulated in "The Call".
- **(b)** If a member club does not have duly reported representation at the convention and members from the club are present, the District Director or representative may designate delegates from these members of the club.

On your **registration form** for the convention, found in this issue of *The Mahonia*, or on the OSFGC website, you will see a listing of identification for the Registrar:

 Club President
 Delegate
Alternate Delegate, etc.

Check the appropriate line on the registration form.

It is the responsibility of the alternate to be at convention in order for him/her to take the place of the delegate, should that person not be able to perform the duty of attending meetings and voting. By already having that designation on your registration, the Credentials Committee will be able to sign you in.

The OSFGC Convention of 2015 is offering you the opportunity to see part of the Oregon Coast's "Clean, Green and Pristine" environment. On June 17th, we're presenting something a bit different ... a bus tour and a self-guided tour.

Bus tour - The first fifty signed up for the bus tour will meet in the Hotel lobby. Along the way, you'll hear a narration of the Coos Bay history from yesteryear and visit Cranberry Sweets, Chuck's Seafood and Shore Acres State Park. Remember to sign-up on the Registration Form!

Self-guided tours – In addition to the locations listed above, visit the Coos Historical and Maritime Museum, plus more sights. Driving directions are listed on the reverse.







Cranberry Sweets and More produces over 150 original confections, including sea salt caramels, truffles, chocolates, tea cookies, brittles, toffee and jelly candy. They're dedicated to preserving the taste and identity of our country's regional specialty foods as well as providing their customers all the free samples possible. Directions to Cranberry Sweets & More: Turn left at the signal light when leaving the Mill Casino, which puts you on Hwy 101 South. At the next traffic signal, turn right at Newmark and travel 2.5 miles. Destination is on the left.



Chuck's Seafood is famous for the finest salmon, albacore tuna, crab, oysters and other fine seafood.

Known for their mouthwatering oyster sticks, smoked oysters, smoked tuna, crab and salmon. Directions to Chuck's Seafood: Turn left at the signal light when leaving the Mill

Casino, which puts you on Hwy 101 South. At the next traffic signal, turn right at Newmark and travel 2.9 miles. Turn left onto Cape Arago Hwy and go approximately 7 miles. Chuck's is on right side of street, on the corner.



Sunset Bay State Park is administered by the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department. It offers a crescent shaped beach, tide pools, hiking trails and a year-round campground.

Shore Acres State Park is an Oregon State Park

located on Cape Arago Highway south of Coos Bay. The park features 5 acres of formal gardens including a rose-testing plot and Japanese lily pond. Directions to Shore Acres State Park: Turn left at the signal light when



leaving the Mill Casino, which puts you on Hwy 101 South. At the next traffic signal, turn right at Newmark and travel 2.9 miles. Turn left onto Cape Arago Hwy and go approximately 9 miles to the park.

Simpson Reef and Shell Island are within Oregon Islands National Wildlife Refuge. The offshore rocks, islands and reefs provide breeding and resting areas for seabirds and marine mammals: seals, sea lions, gray whales and osprey birds.

Coos Historical and Maritime Museum – Exhibits will include pictures, artifacts, written word, and possibly interactive touch screens. The museum will be up and running by Memorial Day and there will be an admission fee. Stories told include



those of survival and tough, gritty people of the Coos River men and the Coos Bay bar pilots. Directions to Coos Historical and Maritime Museum: Turn left at the signal light when leaving the Mill Casino, which puts you on Hwy 101 South. Travel through two signal lights and the museum is on the left, addressed at 1210 N. Bayshore Dr, Coos Bay.

There are several sights to see in the North Bend/Coos Bay area. Brochures or lists will be available.

By Laws and Standing Rules Lynn Chiotti, Chair

The following are changes, deletions and additions proposed for the By Laws and Standing Rules. *Please read them carefully*.

By Laws

ARTICLE V - DUES & FEES

Section 3 (b) Club and per capita dues shall be paid to the OSFGC Treasurer between July 1 and September 30 of that year. Additional dues for members not included in the original report may be remitted prior to March 31.

Proposed Change: Delete 31 and add 15

Final Version to read:

Section 3 (b) Club and per capita dues shall be paid to the OSFGC Treasurer between July 1 and September 30 of that year. Additional dues for members not included in the original report may be remitted prior to March 15.

Rationale: Because the deadline for dues to NGC are due March 31, the Treasurer would need the dues early enough to send them to NGC.

Section 3 (e) New members joining after January 1st and before April 30th shall pay dues of \$1.50 to the OSFGC Treasurer. *Proposed Change:* Delete \$1.50 and insert new line to read "shall be half the current rate."

Final Version to read:

Section 3 (e) Dues for new members joining on or after January 1st shall be half the current rate.

Rationale: Amount is consistent with our other dues fee.

Section 7 State Life Membership applications shall be mailed to that chairman along with a fee of \$50, which shall be credited to the Claire Hanley Scholarship Fund.

Proposed change: Add plus \$5 for the pin.

Final Version to read:

Section 7 State Life Membership applications shall be mailed to that chairman along with a fee of \$50 plus \$5 for the pin, which shall be credited to the Claire Hanley Scholarship Fund.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 2 (g) Furnish a satisfactory bond, at the expense of OSFGC, Inc. to cover a sum sufficient to protect OSFGC, Inc. from loss. The bond shall be not less than \$150,000 and the insurance to be handled by the Insurance Chairman in a timely manner.

Proposed change: Delete, remove completely

Rationale: The Insurance Chairman procures a policy that is appropriate to cover the President, Treasurer, and any other check signer. Neither of these officers is furnishing a bond.

Section 7 (j) Furnish a satisfactory bond, at the expense of OSFGC, to remain in force until final reports are accepted by the Board of Directors: and

Proposed change: Delete, remove completely.

Rationale: The Insurance Chairman procures a policy that is appropriate to cover The President, Treasurer, and any other check signer. Neither of these officers is furnishing a bond.

Add: New

Section 1 (c) Officers shall be covered by insurance in a sum sufficient to protect OSFGC, Inc. from financial loss, at the expense of OSFGC, Inc., to be secured by the Insurance Chairman at the beginning of each term.

Section 7 (g) Have accounts audited by an accountant at the close of each biennium (end of term) at the expense of OSFGC, unless otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors:

Proposed change: Delete, remove completely

Insert: New

Section 7 (g) Review the accounts at the close of each biennium by the members of the Board of Directors, unless otherwise ordered by the Executive Committee. Any request for a review of the financial records must be given in writing a minimum of 5 (five) days before the requested review to allow time for the records to be copied. Refer to ORS.65.774

Rationale: For many years this is how it has been done. The treasurer feels it would be very expensive to have an accountant do a full audit. The accountant prepares the necessary tax forms reviewing as much as necessary to do so.

Add: New

Section 8 (e) Be a member of the By-laws Committee.

Rationale: The Parliamentarian is already a member of this

committee and should always be consulted on guidelines as written in Roberts Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VII - BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 2 Meetings The Board of Directors shall meet three times each year. In an election year there shall be a post-convention meeting of the incoming Board of Directors for the purposes of (a) electing a nominating committee, (b) approving one of three signed written bids for the Directory Handbook printing secured by the corresponding secretary, (c) ratifying standing and special chairmen, and (d) acting on such other immediate necessary business. The time of this meeting will be given in the convention call.

Proposed change: Delete (a) electing a nominating committee, (b) approving one of three signed written bids for the Directory Handbook printing secured by the corresponding Secretary, (c) ratifying standing and special chairman and (d)

Final Version to read:

The Board of Directors shall meet three times each year. In an election year there shall be a post-convention meeting of the incoming Board of Directors for the purpose of acting on immediate necessary business. The time of this meeting will be given in the convention call.

Rationale: Our Bylaws include information that is too specific. All of the items listed above should be in the Policy and Procedure Manual. We do have a Handbook Editor and that person secures the bids at this point, not the Corresponding Secretary.

Standing Rules

5. Rule is correct.

Add: Complimentary copies shall be sent to the president of each club and past OSFGC Presidents. *Passed 10-11-2010; Accidentally omitted in Directory*

Final Version to read:

A copy shall be e-mailed to each District Director, who will send it to each club President. Complimentary copies shall be sent to the president of each club and former OSFGC Presidents. *Passed 10-11-2010*; Note: *It will be the responsibility of the*

President to send it to each of their members.

6. Regional Director The Treasurer shall be empowered to pay annual allowance for expenses as follows:

Add: ...to be valid when an OSFGC member is in the office as Pacific Regional Director

- **(a)** \$30 per allowed delegate from the general fund to the Pacific Region Treasurer.
- **(b)** \$500 for travel when Regional Director from Oregon \$250 in July and \$250 in January, plus package plan for NGC Convention.

Suggested change:

- **(b)** Travel for Regional Director of \$500 (\$250 in July and \$250 in January); plus package plan for NGC Convention.
- **(c)** The Treasurer shall put \$50 in Regional Savings each year from the general fund.

Final Version to read:

- **6. Regional Director** The Treasurer shall be empowered to pay annual allowance for expenses to be valid when an OSFGC member is in the office as Pacific Regional Director as follows:
- **(a)** \$30 per allowed delegate from the general fund to the Pacific Region Treasurer.

For the last three years, "Gardener of the Year" awards have been offered with awards given at state convention. This program is open and these awards are to be given in 2015. What needs to be done to enter this award program?

- Photos are taken and a typewritten script is developed that will be displayed in a portfolio at the state convention. The script is written about the gardener's work developing a garden of any kind from soil preparation to harvest, bloom or maturity. It can also include activities of seasonal maintenance throughout the year. The portfolio can depict a person's efforts in a home garden, a community garden, a junior garden, or planting horticulture projects in a city landscape.
- Each portfolio is sent to this chairperson with a written script about the person featured and presented in 5 to 8 pages, 8 1/2 x 11 size. Illustrations and photos with captions should be included with the script.
- Materials should be contained in a folder and have a cover for presentation. The outside of the folder or cover should be labeled with pertinent information such as the applicant's name, garden club, district, city, address.

Photos that win at the state convention should have a digital file that can be used to display on the OSFGC website.

We had over 70 photos last year and are looking forward to even more this year. The display should be one that will be enjoyed by all.

Our local club learned from a recent membership survey that most people join us to meet new friends who are also interested in gardening. They remain because they like our program topics and community service projects.

Ensure that your individual members have a voice in your club's decisions by offering them a variety of methods to give input and contribute to their club and community.

If you provide a milieu that encourages new ideas and a wide variety of programs, projects, and fun social/work events, you can keep your membership vital. And if your members develop camaraderie by learning and doing community service together, their obvious enjoyment will attract new members to continually revitalize your ranks.

To remain vibrant you must be relevant. And to be relevant, you need to evolve to meet the needs of your members first. Members are the impetus and the core of a healthy community service oriented garden club.
