What works in your Garden, Club, District?

"Edible flowers give two times the flavor – when planted with your vegetables. They look great in the garden and on the plate," according to a horticulturist for OSU. "Adding edible flowers to the garden is going to increase the diversity of plants, which in turn will attract a diverse insect population, including beneficial insects such as pollinators or those that keep pest insects in check."

Nasturtium adds a peppery flavor and bright orange, red and white colors to salads.

Borage has a mild cucumber flavor. Freeze in ice cubes and add a pop of blue to lemonade or summer cocktails.

Use roses to flavor pastry cream, add it to a tart shell and top with raspberries.

Candied flowers are good for topping cupcakes and desserts. Strawberry-lavender milkshakes are amazing.

Cinnamon is great in all kinds of recipes, but did you know that you can use it in the garden too? Besides my screwdrivers I carry a big container of cinnamon in my garden bucket. I sprinkle the cinnamon wherever I see earwigs!

And here are some tips from the **Beaverton Garden Club** News letter:

Rooting hormone. Much cheaper then the chemical stuff and just as effective! Just apply cinnamon powder to the stem when you plant the cutting.

Ant deterrent. Ants do not like cinnamon! Sprinkle it in your greenhouse or around your garden beds. It will not kill the ants, but they will stay away from it. Sprinkle it by your doors if ants are coming into your house. They really hate to cross a line of cinnamon!

Members of The Oregon State Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc.:

On occasion a member or better yet, a potential may ask: "Please tell me some of the things Oregon has done this year."

This Madam President is happy to respond, proudly...

We have:

Held both Fall and Spring Board meetings at Garden sites that we have funded for many years: Gardens of Enchantment in Sandy, Oregon where we planted a Dawn Redwood and The Oregon Garden in Silverton, Oregon where the planting was a Canadensis 'Appalachian Red'.

Received the benefits of making those donations with the room rental at the Oregon Garden being \$100 instead of the normal \$500.00 rate.

Accepted the request by our Pacific Region Tree Chairman for each District to plant a tree or shrub. This officer took the challenge a step further and prepared a small Oregon grape for each board member as well as each club in our state with a total of 150 seedlings.

Shared our bounty with food banks and pantries aiming for the goal of 150 pounds per person at the end of the two-year term – now at halfway to our goal.

Membership – the state of being a member, or

Membership – the total number of members in a group, or

Membership – a group of persons associated by some common tie or occupation and regarded as an entity, which clearly defines The Oregon State Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc.

Each of us is a single member who belongs to a Club; all belong to a geographical District and together we all are members of OSFGC.

In preparing this annual report on membership for 2015-2016, a detailed examination of OSFGC membership statistics revealed the following:

The largest Club has 108 members and the smallest Club has 2 members.

In 2014-2015 there were 15 Districts and in 2015-2016 there are 14 Districts (Umpqua lost their only Club).

The largest District has 16 Clubs and the smallest District has 2 Clubs.

The largest District has 684 members and the smallest District has 41 members.

Two Districts established new Clubs this year:

Klamath District added The Tree League and the Bly Garden Club

Capitol District added the Dallas Garden Club

Total membership for 2014-2015 was 2,661.

Current membership for 2015-2016 is 2,654.

There are 8 Oregon Counties (Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Douglas, Harney, Jefferson, Lake and Malheur) that do not belong to a District and therefore do not have a federated Garden Club.

My reason for sharing this information is to "nudge" each of us to consider these questions:

As a Club member, could I help by bringing a friend or neighbor to each Club meeting and encouraging them to join?

Are we selecting Club programs that are based on the interests of our current members, as well as the interests of our prospective members? If we are not sure, perhaps it's time to take an interest survey to see which speaker topics or demonstrations draw the most interest.

Are our Club meeting agendas balanced? That means some business, some planning, some food, some fun and some active involvement! Let's make our Club meetings the DESTINATION meeting people won't want to miss.

District Directors (and other District Officers, too) – Are you checking with your Clubs to <u>see</u> how each is thriving, not just surviving? Visit them, encourage them, call them, offer to help them with a program, teach them and love them.

Is there an area in your District that is not currently being served by a federated Garden Club? Where would be a good place to hold an organizational meeting to test local interest?

How can we reach out to the 8 Oregon Counties that don't yet have an OSFGC Garden Club?

As a State Garden Club organization, what are <u>our</u> membership goals? May I suggest that a realistic goal for 2016-2017 is 3,000 members?

Membership growth means retaining current Members, Clubs and Districts while at the same time adding new Members, forming new Clubs and expanding our Districts.

The hardest part of creating a new Club is just doing it by taking <u>ACTION</u>. For example, the new Dallas Garden Club is 4 months old – it began with 15 members who expressed interest at an organizational meeting – now it has 33 members and is still growing! The same delightful pattern also took place with the new Bly Garden Club.

"Dig it, Flant it, Watch it Grow" was chosen as the theme for the West Linn Old Time Fair Parade to honor the West Linn Garden Club. Members rode on the antique fire truck and walked the parade route as Grand Marshals of this yearly event.

History: West Linn Garden Club is the oldest organized Garden Club in Oregon, organized in 1916 and federated in 1936. One hundred years ago, what started as nine women and a children's parade is now the West Linn Garden Club. At the time, West Linn was a little country town, but from that parade, a group of women interested in the cultivation of various flowers started to meet regularly, calling themselves the West Linn Floral Club as well as the West Linn Rose Club.

The flower shows, rose shows, and parades by the school children were the main interests of the group. In 1925 flower and vegetable competitions in the three grade schools were sponsored by the garden club. Prizes of bulbs were given to the children.

By 1930, men had begun joining, many of whom were employed by Crown Zellerbach pulp and paper mill. By 1934 the club name was officially changed to the West Linn Garden Club. In 1935 members made their first effort to beautify the community with a planting at the west end of the old bridge and with landscaping around the drinking fountain near West Linn City Hall. Later plantings were flowering plum trees on Portland Avenue and in Hammerle Park. In 1944 Andrew Deschamps won the Grand Sweepstakes of the prestigious Portland Rose Show. This was a great honor, and the rosette ribbon and large trophy were displayed in a store window in Oregon City.

Dues were 25 cents for many years and meetings were held in members' homes. By 1986 dues had increased to \$3.50 a year and the forty-plus members needed to meet in the Bolton Fire Hall. Rose and flower shows were held every June; the club participated in the Willamette Community Fair in August and sponsored the entries and judging of the flower and vegetable shows. Many civic projects involved decorating the trees in Hammerle Park at Christmas, encouraging school children in gardening, beautifying the city parks with flowers, shrubs, trees.

The current West Linn Garden Club continues on the same garden path by providing fresh floral arrangements each week to the West Linn Library. In 2013, the Blue Star Marker on I-205 was presented to the city to commemorate the West Linn Centennial. Maddax Woods is a special place for the club as it was the home of Dorothy Maddax, long time garden club member. 2016 is a year long tribute to the West Linn Garden Club Centennial. Long live the garden clubs!



This program educates the public about native raptors and their habitat. We honor the program for their mission to inspire appreciation and stewardship of the Columbia Gorge.




Horticulture Award

She inspires beauty and creativity in all of us. Her enthusiasm, knowledge and leadership made it easy for our Designers Guild to unanimously nominate her for this award. The Mahonia allows me the opportunity to say thank you to everyone involved in selecting me as the Designer of the Year for 2016 and recipient of the Suzy Twist-Powell Design Award trophy. It was an unexpected honor that I appreciate very much.

The Elsie Skinner Progressive Designers Guild members, who nominated me for this award, have suggested that I create twelve different arrangements that could be used for a calendar. Of course, I thought that was a great idea and have already made several arrangements using fresh materials from my garden.

I did not have the pleasure of knowing Suzy Twist-Powell, but have been told about her active participation in the OSFGC and her enthusiasm for flower art. All of this could also describe my mother, Elsie (Dorfman) Skinner, whom I credit for my creative genes and interest in art and the natural world. She, too, was active in OSFGC for many years and, 55 years ago, was a founding member of Ikebana International Chapter 47 here in Portland. The school my mother belonged to was the Ohara school and the school for which I have a teaching certificate is the Sogetsu school. As a more recently established school, Sogetsu has a very modern and dynamic approach to flower art, stressing self expression in the selection and use of materials and containers. I strive to share these design principals, as well as the mechanics and innovative handling of materials in the workshops that I lead and in the flower shows that I enter. All of Western flower art originated in Ikebana.

In addition to my interest in growing plant materials suitable for creative flower art, I also am a potter, making hand built containers that have multiple openings and organic shapes. I particularly enjoy seeing how other designers use my containers and find it very inspiring.

Creating flower art is a spiritual, meditative experience for me and what I choose for the materials and how I assemble them is how I honor the person for whom I am making the arrangement. Included in this article is a photograph of the arrangement I made in the trophy container to honor Suzy Twist-Powell. I

used the variegated rush, with its strong angular lines, to represent many life interests. The variegated horseradish leaf speaks of strength and boldness and the drumstick alliums are highlights in life that add humor and happiness. The "smoke" from <u>Cotinus aurea</u> represents the essence of life and the lingering in our memories of the person who has passed, but lives on in our

hearts.



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

Garden Therapy

Garden Therapy is the use of gardens and garden-related activities to improve physical and mental health, as well as communication and thinking skills.

The benefits of sustained and active interest in gardening include:

- 1. Better physical health through exercise
- 2. Improved mental health through exercise
- 3. The opportunity to associate with others
- 4. The acquisition of new skills
- 5. Just feeling better for being outside, in touch with nature and in the 'great outdoors'.

Gardening can transform lives. We see first-hand how gardening can help individuals and groups, regardless of age or disability, whether it is mental or physical. Some of our Garden Clubs have taken Garden Therapy to heart in their communities. Many individuals and groups work quietly in their communities and we will never know of their good deeds. I would like to take a moment to shout "Hooray" for the accomplishments of just a few that I do know about.

Donna Westwood leads the Flower Therapy Committee of Corvallis. They have a two part program. One part is called Books and Blossoms. Club volunteers create flower arrangements and deliver them to the library and the library delivers them to homebound patrons of Dial-A-Book. Their second project is an Assisted Living Flower Class. Local merchants donate flowers twice a month and volunteers help residents at two local facilities make floral arrangements.

Eva Lou Greiner tells us that the Condon Garden Club pots Amaryllis bulbs every October with residents of the Summit Springs Village Assisted Living Facility. The residents share bragging about the number of blooms as they watch the plants grow. Individual members also assist pre-school and kindergarten groups in planting tiny vegetable gardens and supplying take-home plants for the children.

The Odell Garden Club maintains the local Post Office garden and they make table arrangements at the Hood River Care Center as well as bud vases for the residents and special arrangements for Mother's Day.

Please consider seeking opportunities to grow and train the next generation in garden related activities. They need to develop an interest in caring for and nurturing the world that they will be passing on... not to just their

own but future generations.



The first paragraph on page 36 of the Directory Handbook should be updated as follows:

The OSFGC, Inc. annually purchases a \$ 1,000,000 General Liability Policy which is available to Garden Clubs defined in our Bylaws Article IV, Section 1 and Article V.

What does General Liability Insurance cover? At its most basic it covers the cost of investigating claims and defending against third-party lawsuits. It pays attorney fees, court costs, witness fees, settlements and court ordered judgements. The policy may also cover an injured party's immediate medical expenses and the cost of repairing or replacing their damaged property.

Many of our Garden Clubs request certificates to cover places where flower shows and plant sales are held and for places clubs meet that require insurance. See pages 38 and 39 of the Directory Handbook for more information to order a certificate from your State Insurance Chair.

Your State Insurance Chair is NOT licensed. She welcomes your calls and will follow through with your questions by requesting assistance from our agent. **All questions/concerns/orders must be referred to your State Insurance Chair.** Our agent will not respond to calls from our members.

If a Garden Club wishes to purchase additional insurance this should be shared with the State Insurance Chair as this could impact the General Liability Policy coverage. A copy of the additional insurance will be requested for our files.

All requests for certificates must be sent to the State Insurance Chair via e-mail. All certificates are sent via e-mail by our agent.



Oregon Roadside Council

In 1932, Mrs. Jessie Honeyman, Chair of the Roadside Improvement Committee of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, formed the Oregon Roadside Council (ORC) as an independent, non-profit Corporation to maintain a central organization for individual and group efforts towards the preservation and conservation of Oregon's great asset, her scenic beauty; to affect such legislation as will protect the natural scenery along highways of our State and cooperate with other agencies that have similar objectives.

Over the years, ORC has fought billboard and sign blight (with limited success), given grants for plantings and trimming, served on advisory councils to the State, installed bronze plaques in several spots (the Travel Information Council agreed to maintain the plaques in January 2009) and a number of small things have helped preserve the natural beauty of Oregon roadsides.

In October 2009, the Oregon Roadside Council was dissolved and rejoined the Oregon State Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. The Council made this decision in view of the aging of the Council Board, diminishing membership, and a desire to ensure that the mission would continue.


We will continue to give grants of \$500, \$250 on applying and the other \$250 with completion of the project. We do not ask for Garden Clubs to give money to receive a grant, which the ORC did, but we have no fund raising, so we welcome contributions to further our cause.

There are four members on our committee that make the decisions: Marcia Kay Whitelock, Beverly Seibel, Todd Keppel, and Nan Jean Roller.

Youth Pollinator Gardens Grant

Reports from Districts and Clubs

Capitol District

I had fun hosting the Spring State Board meeting at the Oregon Gardens, especially with all the help of the Executive Board and President Shirley Schmidt and my husband.



The Eugene Garden Club bought enough "Frog" books for each elementary school in the Eugene and Bethel districts. Plus Club members bought books for their own use.











This is an excerpt from Sandra Robinson's article in the Summer issue of the National Gardeners magazine.

Why plant trees? Each minute the equivalent of 48 football fields of trees are lost, or 15 billion trees each year. Annually, it takes 96 mature trees to absorb the CO2 produced by each man, woman, and child on the planet. A recent report of ACTrees noted the enormous monetary, social, and ecological value of trees to society. The report states:

*The average annual net benefit of a mature tree is \$85 in a yard and \$113 on public land.

*Urban forests can reduce annual storm-water runoff by 2-7%, and a mature tree can store 50 to 100 gallons of water during large storms.

*Trees clean the air by absorbing carbon dioxide, sulphur dioxide, nitrous oxides, and other pollutants, and also shade cars and parking lots, reducing ozone emissions from vehicles.

*Mature trees absorb 120-240 pounds of particulate pollution each year.

*Trees and other plants help remediate soils at landfills and other contaminated sites by absorbing, transforming, and containing a number of contaminants.

*A study of children with attention deficit disorders discovered that the effect of a walk through a park is equal to two typical ADHD medications.

*Researchers from Columbia University found childhood asthma rates were highest in parts of the city where tree density was lowest.

*Green environment impacts worker productivity: In one study, workers without nature views from their desks claimed 23% more sick days than workers with views of parks.

*Patients recovering from surgery in hospital rooms with window views of natural scenes had shorter postoperative hospital stays and received fewer negative evaluations in nurses' notes.

*Trees absorb high-frequency noise, which is most distressing to people.

*Trees improve driving safety.

*Studies have found general increases of up to 37% in residential property values associated with the presence of trees and vegetation on a property.

 * Planting 100 million urban trees can store and avoid up to 357 billion tons of carbon over the next 50 years.

*The net cooling effect of a healthy tree is equivalent to 10 room-size air conditioners operating 20 hours a day.

*Urban forests help create and enhance animal and plant habitats and can act as "reservoirs" for endangered species.

Leach Botanical Garden Activities for children and adults

Those of you that live in or near Portland should explore the educational benefits in which you and your children (or grandchildren) may take part. Check Leach Botanical Garden's website for year-round opportunities. I took two classes this summer, Plein Air and Botanical Illustration in the Garden. Both taught techniques I added to my personal style.

In May, a successful "Nature Fair" featuring "Pollinator Power" with 300+ children and their caregivers in attendance learned about how pollinators work their magic. They saw "bees, birds, goats and chickens up close," were able to try out a salmon obstacle course and take part in crafts and other fun filled activities.

The Art in Nature Day Camp was well attended. Their observation and recording skills were honed with close-up exploration of the natural world. Butterfly wings, flowers and bird varieties showed the diversity of color within them, and inspired a wide range of artistic undertakings including painting, print-making, ceramics and sculpture for the young artist.

A series of lectures was presented for the late summer and fall; you might be able to catch the late September or October lectures if this newsletter reaches you before early September. Those of you in areas away from the metro area, if you find an activity you would like to attend, I have two guest rooms available.

The Garden is open Tuesday thru Saturday 9am to 4pm, Sunday 1:00 to 4pm, with the gift shop open Tuesday thru Saturday 10am to 3:50pm and Sunday 1:00 to 3:50pm. Self-guided tours are easy and you may do as much or as little as your time permits. Free guided tours are every Saturday 11am to noon. Remember the Honey Bee Hikes for Pre-school Children are every Wednesday all year. This is a great program for you to take your grandchildren to.
