at: **OregonGardenClubs.org** and select the Penny Pine Form on the Forms link at the top of the Home page. Follow the directions and send the form and a check made out to the OSFGC, Inc. Treasurer listed on the form. Be sure to indicate **Penny Pines** on the bottom of the check. Once it is processed, you will receive a certificate to give to the recipient.

You may indicate what National Forest you wish to have the trees given to. The trees will be of a type typically found in that forest. The National Forests devastated by the recent wildfires include Mt. Hood, Willamette, Siuslaw, Fremont-Winema, Umpqua, and Rogue-Siskiyou. If you have one of the local Federated Garden Clubs in your area, please contact them. The Clubs are also on the website listed above. OSFGC, Inc.'s goal is to collect enough funds to replant at least 100 acres or more.

Please help us make a difference in our forests in Oregon. It will be many years before our forests are restored to the lush green areas for which Oregon is known. Remember to be good stewards of our public lands.

By now, you're wondering how you can secure your copy, right? Here's how:


- The book will soon be available on the Pacific Region Garden Clubs website: pacificrefgongardenclubs.org. It is free to use online or download and place in a small notebook.
