I want to talk about my President's Theme. It is **LEARN, SHARE, GROW.** Your OSFGC "CREW" hopes to motivate you to:

  - YOUR UNIQUE KNOWLEDGE, AND

  - AS A PERSON (AND MAYBE GROW A NEW PLANT!).

You heard me right, I said CREW. To me, TEAM says "competition," winners and losers. An OSFGC member is never a "loser!" We are only WINNERS!

To me, CREW says people working together to get a job done. Each person with their own special part of that job, but all working toward a common goal. We are all working toward the goals of making our organization strong, welcoming new people who join us, celebrating with our members, and always learning new things.

I need to introduce my President's Project. I am calling it **The Wheelchair Project**.

What exactly is it? Last year I saw an article in the Oregonian newspaper (August 19, 2022) about free rentals of beach-accessible wheelchairs available at some Oregon beaches. The special chairs enabled mobility-challenged individuals to get onto the beach and have fun with their family and friends.

The chairs have special wheels and can be used by anyone, not just kids or adults. They come in different sizes and can be purchased with brakes (making it easier to get in and out of the chair), and other accessories. The article listed 12 places where the chairs can be found.

For my project, I would like to collect money to buy at least one chair and donate it to one of the locations listed in the article. There are all-terrain electric track chairs, too, but they run upwards of \$20,000 each. The manual ones can cost as little as \$2,500. I would rather help raise money for a manual chair.

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I believe that having more beach accessibility would encourage conservation with people learning why the ocean beaches are important to our environment. Experiencing nature could lead to more respect for it. Parents, other family members, and friends will be made aware of how precious, as well as beautiful, our Oregon beaches are. Have fun and appreciate nature...what could be better than that?

My plan is to raise the money needed to buy a chair over the next year. Re-access how we are doing, and buy a chair if enough money is collected. If it takes longer to raise the necessary funds, I would continue the project for the next year. If more than sufficient funds are raised, we can talk about continuing the project to raise the rest of the money for another chair, or we could possibly donate those extra funds to Shriner's Hospital in Portland.

A committee has been formed to flesh-out the details and report the results. The Wheelchair Project was voted on at Convention and unanimously approved.

Peggy Olin and our new Chaplin, Lauree Winfield, would welcome your help with this project. We are hoping to have more information at the Fall State Board Meeting on October 7th in Eugene.

During my 2-year term as OSFGC President, 2021-2023, I:

- Sold 300 Cloth Grocery Tote Bags with my theme printed on them. From each sale, I donated \$1.00 to the Promise Trees Project.
- Held Fall and Spring Board of Directors meetings.
- Encouraged members to invite family and friends to their garden club meetings.
- Invited our National President, Brenda Moore, to attend the OSFGC Convention 2023.
- Distributed 670 vouchers from July 1, 2022, through May 17, 2023 for The Promise Trees Project.
- During 2022-2023 there were 2179 members with 236 new members.
- Attended two Blue Star Memorial Marker dedications. The first one was in Hood River at the Parkdale Bicentennial Garden. It is the Parkdale Blue Star By-Way Marker. The second one was in Dallas, at the Dallas Post Office, which was the first marker in Polk County and the 93rd Blue Star marker dedicated in Oregon. It is the Dallas Post Office Blue Star Highway Marker.

- Was honored to have Eliska Pierce, an Oregon student, be selected as the recipient of the Linda Nelson Bentson National Scholarship Award in the amount of \$3,800.
- Upgraded our website and added more information regularly (www.oregongardenclubs.org)
- Traveled the State visiting ten of thirteen districts during their Fall or Spring District Meetings.
- Submitted black and white digital pictures for the Photography Contest.
- From Jun 2022 through June 2023 there were thirteen OSFGC Life Memberships, and one National Life Membership.
- Created over nine hundred pollinator gardens throughout Oregon.
- We lost the Blue Mountain District which covered three garden clubs.
- · Eleven clubs have disbanded.
- We have recruited three new clubs, one each in Rogue District, Santiam District, and in the Portland District
- Oregon has twenty-five accredited flower show judges.
- The Portland Judges Council held Class 1 Flower Show School with 32 attending in October 2022.
- Began the monthly Executive Committee Zoom
   Meetings and the bi-monthly Zoom meetings with
   district directors and club presidents. These
   meetings provided continued conversation between
   the State and districts and State and garden clubs.

## **Director's Report**

Pioneer District has thirteen clubs on the roster. Chehalem elected not to disband but to reorganize. However, Hillsboro did disband. We now have 514 members in the district.

The clubs are actively seeking new members, while trying to promote healthy, active clubs within their own group.

We had a successful Spring District Meeting in McMinnville at the Yamhill County Heritage Center on April 20th. The meeting was well attended, and we had a wonderful speaker, Kevin Vaughn, teaching us about hybridizing. The McMinnville Garden Club and the Oregon Camellia Society were our hosts.

Three district clubs held plant sales on May 13. Tigard's was at the Bull Mountain Farmers Market, Beaverton's at the Nexus Church and St Helens had one at the St. Helens library. All did very well.

McMinnville hosted itheir 22nd Annual Garden Tour and Faire on June 11, with 6 gardens and many garden-themed vendors, making it one of the largest they have held.

Robin Hood grew from 31 to 43 members over the past year. They held a plant sale last month as well. It combined many handmade items as well as plants. They also created a Facebook page.

Scappoose Garden Club now has 39 members. They built a pollinator garden at the local Fairgrounds and members have committed to planting pollinator friendly plants in their yards this year.

## Siskiyou District Report

Siskiyou District held their annual District Meeting in April with great success. The host club was Illinois Valley and all six clubs were well represented. A wide variety of colorful fresh flowers in an assortment of small vases decorated the entire room. It was a beautiful site.

We had two program presentations; "Plant a Pollinator Friendly Garden" and "Perennials Loved by Pollinators."

One of the highlights of the event was the "Apron Auction." This was a District fundraiser that raised over \$400. Some very creative members shared their talents to help support District operations.

In keeping with President Cheryl's theme, all the clubs in the District continue to tend their pollinator gardens. Some have enhanced existing gardens while others have created new ones. The heavy spring rains in the valley helped wake up the gardens and bring out the bees and butterflies to pollinate the spring flowers.

District membership continues to increase in our clubs. It's exciting to see all the new faces -- a sign that good things are happening.

This is the time of year when all Siskiyou District clubs take their turn providing fresh flowers for the VA Chapel at the Southern Oregon Rehabilitation Center (also known as the Dom) in White City. This is a tradition that began in 1943 when the domiciliary was established and continues to this day.

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## **Siskiyou District Report**

Our progress continues with the Promise Trees project working with local clubs and organizations to obtain contact with families affected by the 2020 fires in Jackson County. To date, 48 tree vouchers have been issued in Jackson County.

However, in Lincoln County Judi Barkley did a wonderful job working together with the "Landscaping with Love" organization. Most people who are rebuilding got and used their vouchers.

Also in Siskiyou District, Kathy Simmons has been working together with an arborist and Hazard Mitigation Coordinator from the city of Talent; Mike Oxendine who has been very helpful and is instrumental in getting the word out and handing out vouchers.

In Klamath County Stephanie Pickern has worked together with the Fire Department in Chiloquin and almost all the fire victims have used their vouchers. There have been requests from People from the 2021 Bootleg Fire for vouchers

In Eugene Pat Kramer worked together with the city building Department. They had one person in their department, Marianne Nolte, take care of the vouchers. They have been very helpful but there are too not as many people, as expected, who are rebuilding.

The OSFGC Board approved the request from The Promise Trees Team who asked to extend the deadline of the vouchers to December 2026 and to also hand out vouchers to homeowners who lost their homes in later fires.



## Oregon Flower Show Judges Credentials Report

Oregon has 25 accredited Flower Show judges.

Fourteen of these judges attended a 3 day symposium in Tacoma, Washington to renew their credentials. Flower show judges are required every 3 years to renew with a symposium. They are also required to judge shows, exhibit horticulture and designs in shows or County Fairs.

- Portland Judges council held a Class 1 Flower Show School with 36 attending in October 2022.
- There were 12 students attending from Washington, 2 from Oregon and 1 from Montana that passed the 3 day class. One day is on Horticulture and flower show procedure and next day on Design.
- The national instructors were from Tennessee and Florida.
- Flower Show school Class #3 will be held in Oregon in October 2023. For those students working to become flower show judges.
- Washington held class #2 and will hold
- Sharing these classes and symposiums with Washington has been beneficial for both states.
- We now have 2 Oregon students that have passed 2 classes and will continue to attend the last two.

## DIGGING INTO DIVERSITY

## **Digging into Diversity**

It seems that diversity is almost always a good thing. Studies have shown that diverse (human) work groups produce superior outcomes and that ecosystems with high species diversity are more resilient to stresses than those with low diversity. Many other examples abound.

When it comes to pollinators and flowers, we find the same diversity principles coming into play. An essential message that I try to convey during my various pollinator or bee presentations is that if you want to ensure a diversity of pollinators in your landscape, you need to provide a diversity of plants. With flowering plants, you want a selection that provides temporal bloom diversity. That means making sure that your pollinating visitors will find blooms from late Winter or early Spring through the Fall. But diversity in bloom time is not the only aspect of floral diversity that is important.

Ideally you also want to provide a range of flower shapes. This concept is very obvious if you think about hummingbirds - they love a long corolla. Many types of bees are attracted to open flowers like sunflowers. Have you ever seen a hummingbird visiting a sunflower? (If you have, it was almost certainly gleaning insects or collecting bits of spider web silk for a nest.)

It turns out that the interplay between flower shapes and bees is actually quite complicated. Scientists that study these interactions have devised extremely clever experiments over the years. Among other things they've determined that bees prefer flowers with symmetry, either radial or bilateral. Different bee species have different tongue lengths and, even though we can't normally see this in the garden, it affects which flowers they select, much like the hummingbird mentioned above.

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## **Digging into Diversity**

This article could continue on for pages, examining various interesting factoids about bees and flowers, but we don't have the space to do that here. Let me leave you with a few images to help capture diversity concepts visually. As the saying goes, a picture is worth a thousand words. Can you match the bees to a suitable flower?

## **BOOK REVIEW**



# Garden Allies The Insects, Birds & Other Animals That Keep Your Garden Beautiful and Thriving

by Frédérique Lavoipierre

This wonderful book gets my "Entertainment and Educational" seal of approval. Many writers don't seem to be able to meld the above two approaches to dealing with subjects, but Lavoipierre manages to do so throughout the book. Whether you are looking to be entertained, educated, or both, this book is highly recommended.

Garden Allies is a collection of 44 short (two-to-three pages) essays, originally published in <a href="Pacific Horticulture Magazine">Pacific Horticulture Magazine</a> and filled with interesting factoids. There are technical names introduced, but they are there for the sake of completeness and don't need to be memorized. The perfect approach to working through the book is to grab a cup of coffee, find a quiet place to sit, and read two or three essays at a sitting. Then, give the knowledge plenty of time to be absorbed before continuing the book at another sitting. This is the "take a few bites of dessert at a time" approach that I try to take with books that make for especially pleasurable reading.

It is fitting that Lavoipierre starts off with John Muir's well-known quote:

"When we try to pick out anything by itself, we find it hitched to everything else in the Universe."

As the reader gains more understanding of the many common organisms found in a typical garden and how these organisms are interrelated, Muir's quote becomes realized.

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## **Garden Allies**

Lavoipierre reminds us that "It's not enough to just grow pretty flowers for our garden allies. Many . . . garden allies don't even need pollen and nectar, but have different habitat requirements that we can supply. Garden design is just as important as careful plant selection, as it incorporates all aspects of supporting the organisms in a healthy garden."

Who are these garden denizens and what makes them special? A random sampling might contain the following examples. We learn that:

- A single earthworm may produce up to 10 pounds of nutrient-rich castings per year.
- Tardigrades, soil inhabitants that are barely visible to the naked eye, can survive temperatures from -459 F to 300 F.
- Fairyflies (actually wasps) are the smallest flying insects, about the size of a "."
- Lady beetles can be found year-round, and that we should never buy them. Instead, provide habitat and let nature take its course.
- Crickets have been culturally important throughout history, and that in Japan, elaborate cages are built so that cricket music can be properly enjoyed. There is even a festival based on insect music.
