OREGON ROADSIDE COUNCIL FORTY YEARS OF FEDERATION (FROM PAGE 9 OF *ROADSIDES OF OREGON*)

"In 1929, Oregon with an active Roadside Beautification Project already under the leadership, first, of Mrs. A.E. Rockey, and then, Mrs. Jessie Honeyman, with local clubs appealing to property owners for roadside cleanup in preparation for later plantings of trees and shrubs, was chosen as the second state for a survey of highway conditions and the best methods of correcting the evils found. Under the sponsorship of the National Council of Protection of Roadside Beauty and the American Nature Association, the survey was conducted by Mrs. W.L. Lawton of New Jersey. The survey was partly financed by contributions from garden clubs amounting to \$500 and later funded by a gift of money from the president of one of the sponsoring national organizations."

"Seven thousand copies of the Lawton report titled Roadsides of Oregon were printed and distributed nationally."

This is a booklet which gives striking pictures of automobile boneyards, ill assorted billboards, hot dog stands, ragged logged land, and other eyesores that prevented the traveler on the highways full enjoyment of the real beauties that Oregon has to offer. The slogan was "S.O.S. Save Oregon Scenery" and one objective was to keep Oregon "Prettied Up for Visitors." The Oregon Roadside Council maintains a copy of the report and The Oregon State Library in Salem also has a copy.

THE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE OREGON ROADSIDE COUNCIL ARE BASICALLY THOSE SET FORTH IN 1932.

- 1. To maintain an environmentally oriented organization for individual and group efforts toward preservation and enhancement of Oregon's scenic areas.
- 2. To promote and support every effort to preserve and increase the natural beauty of our highways and roadsides.
- 3. To oppose legislation efforts at the local, state, and national levels which defeat or impair the objectives of the organization.
- 4. To work with government agencies and governing bodies to restrict and control sign blight in the state of Oregon and to cooperate and assist the work of other like-minded organizations.

All persons who support the goals and objectives of the Oregon Roadside Council are eligible for membership and become active members upon payment of annual dues to the Oregon State Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc.
